



## **RACE HISTORY**

Known as the Garden Course for the beauty of its setting in the southern industrial area of Durban, Clairwood has been the venue for some of the most exciting racing seen in South Africa with the Grade 1 Champions Cup of R500 000 heading this winter season. It is also the home of the R600 000 Grade 1 Gold Challenge, the Grade 1 Mercury Sprint, South Africa's leading open weight-for-age speed clash, and the distance classics in the province, the Gold Circle Derby and the Gold Circle Oaks and became the new home in 2003 of the Premiers Champion Stakes and the Thekwini Fillies Stakes.

# **Gold Challenge**

**R600 000 – SATURDAY, 14 JUNE**

A weight-for-age race over 1 600 metres originally run as the Clairwood Champion Stakes, it has traditionally attracted the best milers in the country and, in fact, some of the finest thoroughbreds to have graced the country's turf.

The incredible Sentinel, trained by Joe Joseph, won it in 1972 and 1973 and Syd Laird's Yataghan, ridden by Bert Hayden, won it in 1974, a year after winning the Durban July. Politician, trained by Syd Laird, won the race in 1978, the same year he won the Durban July and this was also achieved by Over The Air in 1979. This New South Wales colt, trained by Peter Kannemeyer and ridden by Garth Puller, also won it in 1980 and 1981, completing the hat-trick, and Wolf Power won it two years in a row after that. It was in the year of Wolf Power's second victory, 1983, that the race became the Schweppes Challenge with a stake of R100 000. It was then run as the Nissan Challenge from 1996 before becoming the Nissan Cup in 1999 and in 2000 the Gold Challenge. David Payne's Spanish Pool won it twice in 1984 and 1985 and Terrance Millard scored his first victory with Fools Home in 1986. Millard went on to win it again with Royal Chalice in 1988 and with Jungle Warrior in 1990.

Then it was the mighty Flaming Rock who stormed to victory in 1991, 1992 and 1993 and bid for a fourth win in 1994, but was beaten into third place by Pas De Quoi and Take A Walk.

In addition to the hat-trick with Over The Air, Peter Kannemeyer won the race with Priceless Asset in 1989 and Pas De Quoi in 1994 while his son, Dean, thwarted Jet

Master's bid for a double in the year 2000 when Free My Heart got up in the closing stages to beat Tony Millard's charge who had won in 1999.

## **2007**

This year saw an outstanding field face the starter but the punters had eyes for only one runner in the 15-horse field, the impressive three-year-old from the Mike de Kock yard, Kildonan. Having won five of his six races including three feature events, the bookmakers never offered better than 18-10 for the bay colt.

As the punters poured thousands onto the favourite, they failed to give a second thought to L'Ormarins Queen's Plate and J&B Met winner Pocket Power or to Met-placed and Drill Hall Stakes winner Succesful Bidder who were allowed to pass through the pens at 14-1. It was only the multiple feature race winning three-year-old from the Cape, Jay Peg, that commanded any respect as 5-1 second favourite with 10-1 and better the balance of the field.

But those who backed Kildonan can never say they did not get a run for their money. In fact, they witnessed one of the most spectacular finishes in the history of this race.

With front-runner National Spirit setting the pace ahead of Majestic Sun, Kildonan was settled in third place ahead of Malteme and Jay Peg. As they turned for home Weichong Marwing sent his charge for the line and Kildonan shot to the front hoping to poach a winning lead.

Although he had won the Premier's Champion Stakes over a mile at Clairwood as a juvenile the previous year, there had been doubts in the minds of some regarding Kildonan's staying power. In spite of having broken the course record in the Golden Horse Casino Sprint in his previous race, he was running strongly as they headed for the line. But also running on, however, was Succesful Bidder who got to Kildonan and they became locked in a great battle.

But finishing faster than both of them from the back of the field and covering the final 400m in 22.38 seconds, was the champion from the Cape, Pocket Power. He swooped down on them in the final strides and the three crossed the line as one horse with the judge being called on to determine the winner.

The photo declared Sean Tarry's Succesful Bidder the victor by a short head from Pocket Power with Kildonan a short head further back in third place.

What a great finish to a fantastic race!

### R500 000 - SUNDAY, 20 JULY

Run since 1976 and formerly known as the Natal Flying Championship, this race became the Mercury Sprint in 1986 and is now the longest running media-sponsored race in South Africa.

As an open weight-for-age contest over 1 200 metres and coming at the end of the racing season, this race is considered the ultimate test for the leading speed horses in the country, the race that determines who is the champion sprinter.

The race has produced some outstanding performances and thrilling contests over the years, the most spectacular being the neck and neck duel in 1988 between Splendid Ann and Springing Leopard, both trained by Terrance Millard, with the filly just getting the decision. This was a magnificent filly and on her way to winning the Mercury Sprint she ran second in the Gilbey's Trial, won the South African Fillies Sprint and then won the Gilbey's Stakes.

Signor Amigo won the race two years running in 1992 and 1993 and the Cape's super sprinter, Flobayou, has the distinction of having passed the post first three years running from 1995 to 1997. However, in 1996 he shared the dead-heat result with Shoe Express.

#### 2007

Durban was abuzz with talk about this race as the fabulous sprinter Mythical Flight was looking to regain his status as the country's champion sprinter after a narrow defeat in the Golden Horse Casino Sprint by Kildonan. He had suffered the first defeat in his eight-race career and there were questions about his ability to stay the 1 200m and rumours that not all was well with the Jet Master gelding.

In spite of this Mythical Flight opened favourite at 6-10 and was supported in to 4-10 by the time the 14 runners entered the starting stalls. Rebel King, who was fourth in the Golden Horse Casino Sprint and second to Mythical Flight in the Computaform Sprint, was on offer at 4-1 initially but drifted out to 6-1 and War Artist, third in the Golden Horse Casino Sprint, drifted out to 10-1 from 7-1 by the time the gates burst open.

As expected Mythical Flight was quickly into stride and pulled clear of the field and with 200m to go it looked all over by the shouting. But what looked like another easy win for the flying machine soon changed complexion as Rebel King and War Artist began to close in.

As the pair closed on Mythical Flight it was obvious he was not travelling as well as expected and striding a little short on his off fore. He fought on gamely as best he could but War Artist was doing the better work as they approached the line and raced through to win by nearly a length from Rebel King with Mythical Flight a neck back in third place.

### **SATURDAY, 28 JULY 2006**

Five graded events are showcased, headed by one of the most famous events on the calendar, the R500 000 Grade 1 Champions Cup.

As the major supporting feature, the R500 000 Grade 1 Premier's Champion Stakes is the ultimate contest for two-year-olds with the R350 000 Grade 2 Thekwini Fillies Stakes offering juveniles of the fairer sex their own season closer.

The R300 000 Grade 2 Gold Circle Derby and the R250 000 Grade 2 Gold Circle Oaks complete the classic season for the three-year-olds.

The Champions Cup is run over 1 800 metres and is a conditions event with weights allocated according to the success achieved by the runners since January 1 last year. It is a race with a rich history having first been run in 1924 over 1 800 metres and famous as the Clairwood Winter Handicap before becoming the Mainstay 1800 and thereafter the Sharp Electronics Cup.

It is the premier event run at the southern Durban venue and some of the greatest horses in the history of South African racing have won the race, most notably the incredible Sea Cottage.

The Premier's Champion Stakes was previously run at Greyville on Vodacom Durban July Day as the top clash for two-year-olds in the country. The two-year-old programme has now been adjusted to take the juveniles progressively through the distances from the Gold Reef Casino Resorts Medallion and Allan Robertson Fillies Championship over 1 200 metres at Scottsville in May, through the Golden Horseshoe and the Golden Slipper over 1 400 metres at Greyville on Vodacom Durban July day to culminate with the Premier's Champion Stakes and the Thekwini Fillies Stakes over 1 600 metres at Clairwood on All Stars Day.

The three-year-old programme will also close on this day with the Gold Circle Derby and the Gold Circle Oaks over 2 400 metres, determining the potential future top handicappers South African racing fans can look forward to seeing and from which ranks could come the major contenders for honours in all the big races around the country in the year ahead.

It will truly be the day of the champions, the stars of the equine world and a meeting not to be missed.

# Champions Cup

**R500 000 - SATURDAY, 26 JULY**

A Grade 1 conditions race with a stake of R500 000, this is one of the most famous races on the South African calendar, run formerly as the Clairwood Winter Handicap and attracting the best horses in the country.

Traditionally coming after the Vodacom Durban July, many July runners lined up in this race and some incredible duels were fought – one of the most notable being when the legendary Sea Cottage came from the back of the field to win in the early sixties.

Over 1 800 metres of the testing Clairwood track, this is a hard race commanding good pace and a stout heart and the most memorable finish ever, and still drawing a shake of the head from those who watched it, was that of 1987.

It was the year Bush Telegraph had won the Durban July under 49kg as a three-year-old and four-year-old Model Man, carrying 57kg, had followed him home. The two lined up at Clairwood with the race now featured as the Mainstay 1800. Model Man was 8-10 favourite with 57kg, Bush Telegraph was 18-10 with 53kg having picked up his penalty from the Durban July. Lurking in the line-up at 10-1 was the Gauteng raider, Main Man, under 49kg.

This race produced the most sensational finish. Jeff Lloyd had skated clear on Main Man with his light weight and the two favourites set about reeling him in down the home straight. The crowd went wild as Basil Marcus on Model Man and Garth Puller on Bush Telegraph drove their mounts relentlessly, closing on Main Man with every stride. But it was to no avail – Main Man held on to win by a neck from Model Man with Bush Telegraph a length back in third place.

# Premier's Champion Stakes

**R500 000 – SATURDAY – 26 JULY**

This Grade 1 event over 1 600 metres, previously run at Greyville Racecourse (until 2002), has been an important feature for two-year-olds in the KwaZulu-Natal Winter Season, being the final and biggest clash of the year for juveniles on the South African calendar.

With a stake of R500 000 it always draws the cream of the crop and seldom fails to produce an exciting finish. Many winners of this race have gone on to enjoy top racing careers including the likes of World Over, Mighty Crystal, Imperial Despatch, What A Prospect, Arabian Lass and Rarotonga Treaty.

# THEKWINI FILLIES STAKES

## R350 000 - SATURDAY – 26 JULY

Previously run at Greyville (until 2002), and formerly known as the JB McIntosh Fillies Classic and the Avondale Fillies Classic, it was first run in 1988 and is for two-year-old fillies over 1 600 metres – now for a stake of R350 000.

It is the fillies equivalent of the Premier's Champion Stakes and, as a Grade 1 event over 1 600 metres coming at the end of the season, it is rated as the top race for the juvenile fillies in the country.

It has been won by many top-class fillies over the years and one of the most exciting was in the year 2000 when David Ferraris's Forward Filly held off the flying Hoeberg from the yard of David Payne with the New Zealand-bred filly suffering the first defeat of her career. Imported fillies have done well in this race in recent years, Australian-bred Tracey's Element winning in 1993, Argentina's Ahmatir taking the honours in 1995 and her fellow countrywoman, Paraca, leading the field home in 2002.

# **GOLD CIRCLE DERBY**

## **R300 000– SATURDAY, 26 JULY**

The R300 000 Gold Circle Derby was, until the year 2000, run in the latter part of June and was the final classic event in the path of some three-year-olds into the Vodacom Durban July and, for some, even glory. It was also an important pointer to future top performers in the country's major events.

Terrance Millard used this path for two of his top three-year-olds, Right Prerogative in 1989 and Ilustrador the following year. Both secured their positions in the Durban July after winning the Derby and both went on to win the country's premier event. Ilustrador, who had also earlier won the South African Guineas, went on to make it four from four by winning the Gold Cup at the beginning of August.

Space Walk ran second in the Derby of 1992 and went on the next year to win the Gold Cup. The following year, in 1994, he was awarded the Durban July after an objection was lodged against the winner, Surfing Home. A similar feat was achieved by Milleverof who ran third in the Derby in 1993, won the Gold Cup in 1994 and ran second in the Gold Cup the following year.

### **2007**

Zebra Crossing, who had beaten Vodacom Durban July winner, Dunford earlier in the season and then run second to Rabiya in the Daily News 2200, was just 1.5 lengths behind Dunford in the Vodacom Durban July before winning the Gold Circle Derby and going on to win the J&B Met in early 2006.

Although the Australian-bred Our Giant was a firm favourite throughout, the race had a very open look about it and bookmakers were offering odds below 10-1 on 10 of the 16 runners with Our Giant opening at 3-1 but shortening slightly on the day to 5-2. Desert Links and Man Ray were next in line on the boards at 11-2 and 6-1 with Bound By Honour and Autumn Frost at 8-1 and 10-1 and upwards the rest.

Day Of The Piper got the best of the break from his inside draw but Mark Khan got the Geoff Woodruff-trained Prince Asad quickly in behind him and they made the running from Go Going Gone, Bound To Travel and Pirate's Gold. Our Giant had settled about midfield.

Prince Asad made his move in the home straight and had taken the lead through the 400m mark. He came under pressure briefly from Bound By Honour who soon fell away but a flying Desert Links soon became the danger. Prince Asad kept on gamely to secure the victory by a length from Desert Links with Pirate's Gold staying on well for third and Our Giant making it into fourth place after experiencing a little trouble in the closing stages.

Bred at the Highlands Farms Stud by Al Mufti out of the Foveros mare Thousand Nights, Prince Asad is owned by Mr Y Khan.

# **GOLD CIRCLE OAKS**

**R250 000– SATURDAY, 26 JULY**

First run at Clairwood in 2000, previously run at Scottsville, the R250 000 Gold Circle Oaks was first staged with a stake of R5 000 in 1972 as the Coachman's Oaks and has been run over 2 400 metres since its inception except in 1992 and 1993 when the distance was reduced to 2 000 metres.

A tough race attracting the country's best classic staying fillies, Terrance Millard had the best record in the race with five winners. These were Sandunguera (1978), Taima Bluff (1980), Sortilega (1984), Arcole (1985) and Enchanted Garden (1986).

In 2002, Monyela completed the Oaks double, winning the South African Oaks at Turffontein in April then the Gold Circle Oaks in Durban. Last year Gary Alexander's Jallad filly, Icy Air, repeated the feat but went one better by winning the Woolavington at Greyville in between.

### **2007**

River Jetez, from the very hot stable of Cape trainer Mike Bass, was the firm favourite for the race having come from well back in both the KwaZulu-Natal Guineas and the Daily News 2200 to finish in the placings with flying finishes and the extra distance was where she was likely to be at her best. Her stable companion, Cymbeline, was the only other runner in the 11-horse field having drawn any serious support based on her win in the Winter Oaks at Kenilworth in June.

Outsider Pretty Partner sped away from the field in the early stages opening up a good lead and with a four-lengths advantage going through the 400m mark she looked on

course to cause a 25-1 upset. Clandestine and La Bella Donna were leading the chase at this stage but Karl Neisius drove River Jetez through from midfield with another strong finish to collar 33-1 chance Clandestine close to home and win by half a length.

London Fashion and Cymbeline also ran on from off the pace to fill the minor placings ahead of Pretty Partner who had done her dash in the early stages and had nothing left to offer when the final challenge came.

River Jetez was bred at the Out Of Africa Stud by Jet Master out of the Prince Florimund mare Stormsvlei and was owned by Mr and Mrs C A Amm and Mr N M Shirtliff.
