## Pocket Power fights out a thriller



The 146th renewal of the Queen's Plate run at Kenilworth and sponsored by L'Ormarins, provided a thrilling finish with the joint-favourite Pocket Power expectedly fighting it out but it was not with his anticipated protagonists Eyeofthetiger or National Spirit, but instead with 33-1 longshot, Silver Mist.

The Mike Bass yard had much cause to celebrate as the preparation they gave South Africa's newest star turned out to be the perfect recipe for a horse who is not the easiest to condition due to a history of foot problems.

Pocket Power burst into promi-

nence last season by landing the Winter Challenge Triple Crown after winning the Winter Guineas over 1600m, the Winter Classic over 1800m, and the Winter Derby over 2400m over a six-week period.

Mike Bass's daughter and assistant trainer explained on Tellytrack this week how Pocket Power had not pulled up perfectly sound after any of those races despite the softer going conditions during the Cape Winter.

With summer here and the going now harder, the Bass team thus ran him in three sprint

The 2007 J&B Met is set to be another spectacular event, said Gavin Pike, Marketing Director of Brandhouse, at the barrier draws held in the Parade Ring at Kenilworth Racecourse.

All picnic sites, dining rooms, every balcony, every facility available for pre-booking has been sold. Early indicators suggest that the house-full signs may well be going up once again this year.

2007 is to be the 30th staging of the J&B Met, which makes it one of the longest running event sponsorships in South Africa, and Pike announced that J&B have signed to extend the sponsorship until at least 2010.

The ruling favourite for the R2-million, Grade 1 J&B Met at Kenilworth Racecourse in Cape Town on January 27, Pocket Power, has drawn well at 10. Trainer Mike Bass was very happy with this draw, as was jockey Jeff Lloyd.

Bass's two other charges, Hilgrove and African Appeal, drew very favourably at four and three respectively.

Drawn on the paint is Sean Tarry's Successful Bidder with Basil Marcus's Majestic Sun one off the inside rail.

Karen Newsome of Fieldspring Racing, owners of Vodacom Durban July Champion, Eyeofthetiger, was delighted with the draw of 11, and said that there was no explanation for his

... races before the Queen's Plate, and those were the only gallops he had in the build-up.

The devastating burst of speed he showed in his final start when just failing in the Grade II Diadem Stakes over 1200m left nobody in any doubt as to the class of this brilliant four-year-old son of Jet Master, and at Kenilworth he caught the eye again for the effortless way he moved to the front before labouring in the final stages which, according to jockey Jeff Lloyd, was only due to laziness.

Pocket Power and Vodacom Durban July winner, Eyeofthetiger, started joint-favourites, although Eyeofthetiger was tote favourite. Pocket Power shortened from 28-10 into 16-10 before drifting out to 22-10 at the off while Eyeofthetiger drifted from 5-2 to 28-10 before being backed in to 22-10.

National Spirit, regarded by many as the best miler in the country, had continual on-course support coming in from 9-2 to 3-1.

From the off the Dean Kannemeyer horse, Mosaic Find, expectedly went to the front in order to set the blistering pace that his stable companion Eyeofthetiger would need to be seen at his best over

the 1600m trip which is well short of his optimum trip of 2000m and more.

Basil Marcus's front-runner, Majestic Sun, lay second ahead of the only filly in the race, Soft Landing, with Duty Roster next. Eyeofthetiger was prominent and he and What A Question moved up on either side of the fifth placed but already fading National Spirit as they began the turn for home.

National Spirit had played up at the start and this was to be his second below par run in succession.

# Met expects a grand day

under-performance in the Queen's Plate. The horse was in fine fettle and will be spot-on for the race. Jagged Ice, also from the Dean Kannemeyer stable, drew 12 while the third member of the team, Cyclonic, was badly drawn out at 18.

Charles Laird has three entries for the race and while Lion Tamer at five and Likeithot at six both drew well, Hunting Tower had the worst of the draw at 20.

Laird was unavailable for comment as he is in Australia.

Also not well drawn at 17 was Geoff Woodruff's Elusive Fort and Mike de Kock's SA Bloodstock Cape Guineas runner-up Emperor Napoleon at 19.

Woodruff could not be contacted for comment on his runner's draw or on reports related to a virus in his stable that might prevent Elusive Fort taking part in the race.

De Kock, who is on his way to Dubai but will be back for the J&B Met, said he was quite happy with the draws of both Equal Image and Emperor Napoleon.

"The draw doesn't affect either of them as they both come from off the pace and the wide draw for Emperor Napoleon is better for him."

Equal Image, the ride of British jockey Jamie Spencer, is well drawn at seven with the lone KwaZulu-Natal contender, Pinero, at eight.

De Kock said there was no particular reason why he had engaged Jamie Spencer to ride Equal Image. "He was available and that's it. But he may not be able to ride because he picked up a suspension. I am just waiting to hear."

Unfazed by the draw, Joey Ramsden's Silver Mist, who fought out the finish of the L'Ormarins Queen's Plate with Pocket Power, is drawn a little wide at 15 but he too could benefit from scratchings and eliminations at the final acceptance stage.

Paul Lafferty, trainer of the four-year-old Dominion Royale gelding, Pinero, said his draw at eight was very pleasing as the gelding had shown he could race up with the pace and the draw would be an advantage.

"His win in the Thoroughbred Breeders' Association Peninsula Handicap was very good as he beat Wonder Gold who is highly thought of and we gave him 4.5kg. With 4kg less on his back he has a good galloping weight and Karl Neisius told me after the race that Pinero was a good galloper.

"Obviously this is a much stronger field but we are pleased to be in it. We live in the dream factory and if we can finish in the money we will be happy."

Paul said Pinero was being cared for in the Cape by his very able assistant Byron Foster and they are in contact every day.

"I will be there for the week leading up to the J&B Met for the final preparations for the race."

Paul said he had not yet decided on a jockey and it would depend on who was available.

The consensus seems to be that the bookmakers have got it right – Pocket Power is the one to beat, and considering the current good form of the owners Marsh Shirliff and company, 15/10 is a fair price.

Lloyd had snatched Pocket Power up at the start and moved over from his outside draw to slot in behind the field. He confessed later that he was relieved that not only had the pace been a very strong one but that he could see the usual pacy front-running types, National Spirit and What A Question, just a length or two ahead of him.

Majestic Sun soon took over in the straight but was then challenged by Soft Landing with Eyeofthetiger moving in on the inside. However Pocket Power was simply cruising on the outside and looked to have the race in the bag some way out.

However, the Bass team and owners Marsh Shirliff and Mr and Mrs A D Webber had to go through some agonizing moments late on as Pocket Power began idling in front while the Joey Ramsden runner Silver Mist began wearing away at his lead. Another Bass runner, Hilgrove, was also running on strongly.

### Too soon

Lloyd admitted afterwards he had hit the front too soon, but it was a good learning curve for him before the forthcoming J&B Met, for which Pocket Power is favourite.

Having realised he was in trouble, Lloyd, as ever, did not panic and coaxed his mount home to get home by the shortest of short-heads.

There was a long wait before the result was posted and it was a bitter disappointment for Ramsden and jockey Glen Hatt, the combination who won the race with Winter Solstice a year ago.

Hilgrove was 1.3 lengths back in third whilst the Charles Laird Gauteng raider, Ndabeni, ran on well to finish four lengths further back in fourth.

Pocket Power was purchased for R190 000 at the Cape Yearling sales where he was chosen for Shirliff by Mike Bass himself.

He was bred by Zandvliet Stud and this latest victory was another success for the amazing sire, Jet Master, a brilliant racehorse who won the Queen's Plate twice himself and who has now opened up a big lead in the race for champion sire.

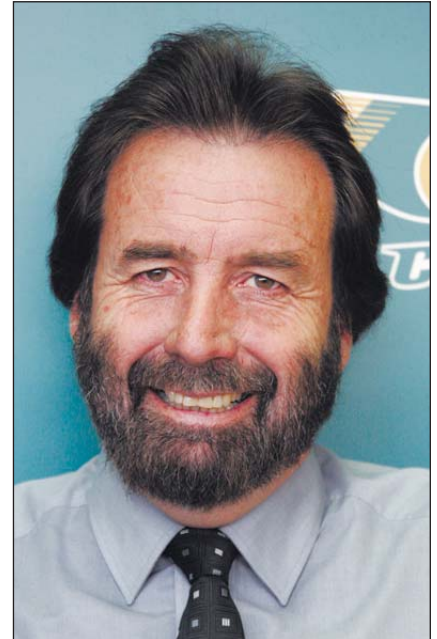
Amy, who is also an accomplished swimmer, has been living in England with her mother Janice and nine-year-old sister, Polly, for the past six years and is to study forensic geography.

## Whyte chases another Hong Kong title

SOUTH African-born jockey Douglas Whyte is well on track to clinch his sixth successive Hong Kong Jockey's Championship.

Whyte, with 38 winners up to Christmas, leads Olivier Doleuze by 8 winners, with stalwart Felix Coetzee in third with 27 winners.

Casper Fownes is the leading trainer with 31 winners and \$HK31 million in gross stake earnings. South Africans David Ferraris (16 winners, \$14 million) and Tony Millard (14 winners, \$8 million) occupy fifth and eighth spots respectively.



## Clever ride gives it to Badger's Gift

The evergreen six-year-old mare, Badger's Gift, won the R350 000 Grade I TBA Paddock Stakes for fillies and mares over 1800m on her third attempt at the Kenilworth new course under a clever start-to-finish ride from the widest draw of all by one of the best up-and-coming riders in the land, apprentice Richard Fourie.

It was Fourie's first Grade I winner and also provided owner, Juan van Heerden, with his first Grade I success.

"She's so game", said ecstatic trainer, Glen Kotzen. "After discussing it with Juan we decided to keep her in training this season."

"Richard asked me what the plan was in the parade ring and I said I don't know. We decided to play it on the break and I said I'd leave it to him."

"There was quite a bit of pace on early," said a beaming Fourie. "I went to the front and slowed it down and dictated. In the straight this mare really wanted to roll. From about the 200 to 150m mark I knew I had it in the bag."

Fourie has now won two out of two on the Badger Land mare, who was bred by Terry Andrews of Sorrento Stud, his other win on her coming over 1400m on the old course here in November.

He read this race correctly, as despite a headwind on the day, most of the winners of the previous races were coming from handy positions. The favourite Sun Classique, who has to be held up and from another wide draw was likely going to have to weave her way through from the back as she did in the Cape Guineas last time out, was always going to be vulnerable to a horse staying on strongly from the front.

So it proved. Jeff Lloyd on three-year-old Sun

Classique, still had a ton of horse beneath him when he finally got through the traffic in the straight but he just had too much ground still to make up and was 2.5 lengths shy of Badger's Gift at the line.

Another Kotzen-trained horse, the four-year-old filly, Kimberlite, also owned by Juan van Heerden although in partnership, was 0.5 lengths further back

in third and also benefited from being in the vanguard at the front as jockey Brandon Morgenrood took her up from her number one draw to lie in second behind her stable companion in the running.

Juan van Heerden was holidaying in Mossel Bay with his family and regretted not being there to see Badger's Gift win.

"She had a bad draw but Richard Fourie rode a brilliant race," he said in a telephonic interview. "I was a bit worried when I saw her going to the front but this mare is so game. I know

whenever she runs I'm going to get a cheque."

Badger's Gift will now be aimed at the Met and should get into the field after this effort.

A qualified chartered accountant who is in the property development business, Van Heerden has been involved in racing for only four years but holds a strong hand already. He bought the Riverworld Stud two-and-a-half years ago and Badger's Gift will stand there after her career.

"We will either send her to Silvano, whom I have shares in and rate very highly, or Jet Master," he said.

Van Heerden also owns Southern Storm, whom he regards as his best horse in training. Injured when second favourite as a three-year-old for last year's July, this strapping son of Jet Master is back in training and will once again be aimed at the Vodacom Durban July.



### Attention racehorse owners: Stake settlement

## Shatter the charity horse has 'em gasping with delight



**S**hatter, the charity horse, romped home in an MR 66 handicap over 1600m at Clairwood, her second win in succession and her third win overall.

The achievement had Ricky Smit, who established the Nicholas Rey Foundation Trust for the benefit of people injured in horse-related accidents, gasping with delight.

The racing career of the three-year-old grey filly by Fard was kindly donated by Mick Goss of Summerhill Stud and was auctioned off at the Nicholas Rey Spring Ball in October 2005 for R80 000. Her career was bought by a table of ten people, who each contributed, and little could they have imagined that just over a year later she would already have stake earnings of R107 300 next to her name. The nominee for the syndicate is Mr Anthony Kerdachi.

At the time of the auction, trainer Dave Goss donated two years' worth of free training fees for Shatter while free veterinary services were donated by Manfred Rohwer of the Summerveld Equine hospital and free farrier fees were donated by Dom Finnis.

Shatter won impressively at Clairwood in what was her first attempt at 1600m.

Jockey Sean Veale had her nicely poised about 3 lengths off the lead as they turned for home and she produced a strong run when asked the question.

She took the lead at about the 200m mark but Veale had to keep her up to her task in the latter stages as she threatened to hang across the track while the favourite, Jewel Of Jwaneng, was rallying back. She stayed on strongly, however, and won by 1 length.

Shatter is due to be retired back to the stud of Mick Goss at the end of her four-year-old career.

Dave Goss reckons she still has another two wins in her and he and the syndicate will play it by ear as to how long they keep her in training, even if it means the two years of free training fees and other services runs out.

The man who lends his name to the trust, Nicholas Rey, was a polo player who had a tragic accident that left him suffering from the rare syndrome known as Locked In Syndrome. Despite his injuries he remains an avid horse lover, and interaction with horses forms part of his physical therapy.

The Trust auctioned off another horse this year called Royal Illusion that was donated by Rob Knuppe, a Cape-based breeder who owns shares in stallions Tara's Hall and Camden Park and who was also the architect of the Grandwest Yearling Sale. Royal Illusion's racing career reached a final bid of R190 000.

The Trust's first beneficiary is Talita van Rooyen, who was paralysed from the waste down after a workriding accident in Cape Town last year, and a custom-made wheelchair is being imported for her.

"The reason we auction off these horses' careers is to create awareness of the Nicholas Rey Foundation," says Smit, a horsewoman herself, who owns and runs the stables and horses that are available for guests of the North Coast's Zimbali Lodge.

Shatter has certainly done her bit in creating awareness of this worthy cause and long may her success continue.

## Kumaran takes out own training licence

KUMARAN NAIDOO, who was assistant trainer for three-and-a-half years to the now retired Selvan Moodley before having a short three-month stint with Tony Rivalland, has taken out his own training licence.

Naidoo has 15 horses under his care and at time of writing was due to move into his own yard at Summerveld from his present location of sharing with Rivalland.

The new yard is complete with an office, a nice walkway, and thirty stables which will allow him to increase his string toward the figure of fifty that he views as a feasible figure in order for a trainer to be competitive.

"You need to race every week and with a small string it's hard, especially when you have young horses," says Naidoo.

Most of Naidoo's horses are two-year-olds. They have just done basic work to date and will be seen at the course later this year. They include a nice Modern Day bought at the Emperor's Palace Ready To Run Sale, a Woodborough, and one from the Sibaya Yearling Sale.

His two chief owners are Seelan Chetty and Sean Pillay although he also has horses from the Team Tyson syndicate that owns the former Summer Cup winner, Tyson, a horse that has also won in Dubai.

Naidoo's career got off to a good start this month with Jadene's Joy getting up in the shadow of the post to give the trainer his first winner.

Zechner and Derryl Daniels ride work for him and there are also two work riders among his grooms.

Naidoo lives in Pietermaritzburg and owes his interest in horseracing to his father who used to take him to the races.

Later his father had horses with Bertie Hayden at Ashburton and, at about the age of 18, Naidoo started working part-time for him, learning a lot from the trainer who is best known as the former stable jockey to the legendary Syd Laird for whom he rode three July winners including the great Politician.

After Hayden had suffered a stroke and was forced to retire, Naidoo landed a position in Selvan Moodley's yard where he worked with the experienced trainer Steve Lodge, who was Moodley's assistant at the time.

Later, former top jockey Rhys van Wyk replaced Lodge so, together with the knowledge he acquired from his three-month stint with Rivalland, Naidoo has had a good grounding in the profession with plenty of diverse opinion to draw from.

He and his clients will be attending the Shongweni Sale in February in order to complement his string.

## UK Lady jocks targeted by sicko

British apprentice Hayley Turner and other female jockeys are being targeted with hate mail by an unknown figure who, in his latest attack, sent a "voodoo" letter to apprentice Francis (Frankie) Pickard.



Turner, last year's joint champion apprentice, confirmed having received several of the letters – which she has passed to police – over the course of the past 18 months.

The British Horseracing Regulatory Authority has also been informed of the disturbing communications with Turner. They included drawings of a grave, marked RIP, a Tarot card signifying death, and the threat: "I'm going to get you."

Turner said: "I've been getting them quite a lot, but it has been reported to the police and they are following the correct procedures."

The letters are believed to have carried a London postmark, and were not sent to Turner's home address, but to trainers for whom she rides. At one time it was thought the letters emanated from a London prison.

Pickard, who is attached to Jamie Osborne's stable in Lambourn, has now become the latest victim of what appears to be a campaign being waged against women jockeys by one nameless individual.

Pickard's agent, Richard Hunter, who also acts on behalf of Turner, said: "Frankie told me she received a letter and that she had reported it to the police.

"It was like a voodoo thing, with all sorts of things on, very similar to what Hayley had received. There are some nutters out there."

Derby winning trainer Michael Bell, to whom Turner was previously apprenticed and continues to ride in her role as a freelance, shed more light on the worrying attacks.

He said: "The letters are sent to Hayley, care of my stable, and they are horrible.

"The contents of them is not pleasant at all. It seems to be someone with a fixation with her. It is not nice for Hayley." – *Racing Post, UK*

## Charles is back in the saddle ... as an owner this time

Prince Charles and his wife Camilla are to have their first horse in training, a filly by King's Best named Royal Superlative.

The plan to race her on the Flat in 2008 represents a change of direction for the prince, for although he is a regular racegoer at Royal Ascot, his previous interest in the sport revolved around jumping, a passion inherited from his late grandmother.

In a brief stint as an amateur jockey he had six rides under rules – five of them over jumps – including Good Prospect, who had the nerve to unseat the heir to the throne twice in five days in March 1981.

### Unshipped

First, Prince Charles was unshipped in Sandown's Grand Military Gold Cup, then in the Kim Muir Chase at the Cheltenham Festival.

Earlier that season, he had ridden Allibar into second in a handicap chase at Ludlow, beaten six lengths by the Keith Reveley-ridden Hello Louis.

In 2003, the registration of the Prince of Wales's silks – "scarlet, royal blue sleeves and black cap" – at Weatherbys was cancelled.

These cherished colours can be reregistered, although it is not known if Prince Charles and his wife will opt to do so.

In March last year, the duo presented the Cheltenham Gold Cup to Anita O'Leary, owner of War

Of Attrition, but their focus will now switch to the Flat.

John Warren, the Queen's racing and bloodstock advisor, said: "I bought the mare, Supereva, at the 2004 Tattersalls December Sale for 110 guineas. She is really nice, has a beautiful pedigree, and is related to a lot of successful stallions.

### Bloodlines

"We were interested in her bloodlines as she is inbred to Natalma, the dam of Northern Dancer and the great grandam of Danehill and Machiavellian, so Supereva has a lovely pedigree, as well as being a five-time winner in Italy."

He added: "We sent her to King's Best as we liked the cross of Kingmambo on top of Sadler's Wells. The resultant foal has been officially named Royal Superlative by the Duchess of Cornwall.

"She is at the Royal Stud in Sandringham and will be sent to a training yard in the autumn. The Prince of Wales and Duchess of Cornwall have not yet decided who their trainer will be."

The Queen's Flat trainers include Sir Michael Stoute, Richard Hannon, and Roger Charlton.

Joe Grimwades, manager of the Royal Studs, told *Thoroughbred Owner & Breeder*: "Royal Superlative is a lovely filly and we are thrilled to bits with her. The Prince of Wales and Duchess of Cornwall have been down to see her, and both were impressed. It is very exciting to have her here."

## Pair banned from riding for 3 months

Jockey Deon Sampson and apprentice M Malherbe have both been banned from riding for three months.

The pair were found guilty by National Horseracing Authority inquiry boards of not giving their respective mounts full opportunity to win or obtain the best possible place in their races.

Sampson, who pleaded not guilty to the charge,

was deemed not to have given Run Angel Run a proper ride in the first race at Newmarket on November 4.

Malherbe also pleaded not guilty to a similar charge while riding Miss Micky in the tenth race at The Vaal on November 16.

Both have the right of appeal against both the finding and the penalty.
